



BACK-TO-SCHOOL ELECTRICAL SAFETY TIPS

s the school season approaches, students and parents can prepare for a new year filled with learning. Along with purchasing school supplies and organizing schedules, it's essential to consider safe electrical measures. With the increased use of electronic devices and appliances in homes and dorm rooms, understanding and implementing safety practices can prevent accidents and ensure a safe environment for everyone.

Understanding Electrical Hazards Electrical hazards can pose significant risks, especially in areas where young students are present. Common hazards include overloaded power strips, damaged cords, and improper use of extension cords. Overloaded power strips can overheat and potentially cause fires, while damaged cords expose live wires that can lead to electrical shocks.

It's crucial to educate children about the dangers of playing with outlets and the importance of reporting any damaged equipment to an adult. Additionally, teaching kids to unplug devices by pulling the plug, not the cord, can prevent wear and tear on the cords and reduce the risk of accidents.

Safe Use of Electrical Devices Students often use laptops, tablets, and other devices for their studies. The safe use of devices is vital to maintaining a safe learning environment. It's important to use devices according to the manufacturer's instructions and avoid using them with wet hands or in damp areas.

Charging devices should be monitored to prevent overheating. When not in use, chargers should be unplugged. Furthermore, using devices with undamaged cords and ensuring that charging stations are not cluttered can minimize the risk of fires and shocks.


Dorm Room Electrical Safety For college students living in dorms, electrical safety takes on added importance due to shared living spaces and increased use of personal appliances. It's essential to follow dorm rules regarding electrical appliance usage, such as restrictions on high-wattage items like hot plates and space heaters.

Using surge protectors with built-in circuit breakers can help protect electronic devices from power surges and prevent overloading circuits. Regularly inspecting appliances for damage and avoiding the use of outdated or faulty equipment can also contribute to a safe living environment. Educating students about the importance of having an emergency plan in place can further enhance dorm room safety.

OAKDALE ELECTRIC YOUTH DELEGATE REPRESENTS CO-OP IN WASHINGTON, D.C.

he Wisconsin Electric Cooperative Association (WECA) led a group of 18 youth delegates from 11 Wisconsin electric cooperatives on a tour of the nation's capital in June. Nearly 2,000 youth delegates and chaperones from 44 states attended the Youth Tour hosted by the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). Among the group of 18 was Oakdale Electric Cooperative's (OEC) delegate and WECA Youth Board member Carson Welter.

Students gained a better understanding of American history and political processes by meeting their state representative and senators. During their packed schedule, students visited multiple sites which included: Capitol Hill, Federal Bureau of Investigation, George Washington's Mount Vernon, Holocaust Museum, Iwo Jima Memorial, MLK Memorial, National Air and Space Museum, the Pentagon, Smithsonian Museum, the White House, WWII Memorial, and more. While visiting Arlington National Cemetery, four students laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on behalf of WECA.

Oakdale Electric sponsors students who are elected to the WECA Youth Board, which is picked during Youth Leadership Conference (YLC) held in July. YLC is free for high school juniors who live on OEC lines, with scholarship opportunities to follow. To be voted onto the youth board by their peers, students must advocate for themselves and should possess leadership qualities.

Carson Welter attended YLC in 2023, was elected to the WECA Youth Board, attended NRECA Youth Tour, and just recently planned and carried out this year's



Photo Contest Rules and Details:


- Contest will run from April 1, 2024, until August 30, 2024; however, submitted photos can be taken outside of this date range.
