WATCH YOUR OCTOBER BILL FOR YOUR CAPITAL CREDIT REFUND

Oakdale Electric Cooperative members will be experiencing one of the benefits of membership this month when capital credit refunds are applied to qualifying active accounts. Refunds are applied to the October bills, which members should receive around November 5.

Capital credits represent your ownership of this non-profit, memberowned cooperative. Capital credits are created when the cooperative has earnings, income minus expenses. At the end of each year, these earnings are spread proportionately to all active cooperative members according to the amount of money each member spent at Oakdale Electric Cooperative that year.

Capital credits accumulate in an account in each member's name and are paid as a percentage each year. The size of the percentage is determined by

Oakdale Electric Cooperative's Board of Directors according to the cooperative's financial condition.


