ONE entry per account number. Employees, directors, as well as immediate family of Oakdale Electric Cooperative, are not eligible.



A GREAT LINEMAN SETS THE BAR HIGH

Toe Engel always knew he wanted to pursue a career where he could work outside with his hands. He received a tip from former line superintendent Dan Hoag that Oakdale Electric Cooperative was hiring a summer help position. Joe applied, and the co-op took a chance on him 39 years ago, and hired him that summer.

Joe went on to be the first student from Tomah Area School District to attend a nine-month power distribution program in Beaver Dam, Wisconsin. "Nine-month school was new to everyone. Up until that point, you were hired with no experience," stated Engel. After graduation, Joe was back at

OEC and worked hard to attain his journeyman lineman status. Not long after, he was promoted to a leadership position as construction foreman, which he held for the final 24 years of his career.

"I had great foremen before me that set the bar high," Joe stated. "I like challenges and felt I had strong leadership skills to be a foreman." Like any job promotion, there comes responsibility, adaptability, challenges, solid communication and more, all of which Joe had no problem living up to. "My analogy is that it's like a football team

here. When you're in charge of a group, you're like the coach. You've got your group of guys on your crew for that day and a job to accomplish. I like the challenge, camaraderie, and felt I could place guys in positions that helped them excel," stated Joe.

Joe will not miss working in extreme weather conditions but he will miss seeing a whole valley light up after a bad storm. The pride and sense of achievement that come with power restoration is a feeling like none other for a lineman. Joe reflected, "I will miss that feeling," and went on to say, "I'll also miss my fellow linemen, my friends. I care deeply about every one of them and I hope I left a mark."

Joe has a strong commitment to his community. He was a volunteer fireman at Tomah Fire Department for 25 years. He stated, "I loved the fire department for the same reasons as I do Oakdale Electric."

Joe has a strong work ethic and taught me almost everything I know. He was never afraid to get his hands dirty and be right in the trenches with you."

"Safety is my top priority. Keeping the crew motivated and working strong as a team to be proficient and successful is a personal goal of mine as construction foreman," stated Kurt. "If I can be half the foreman he was, Oakdale Electric will continue to thrive."


