


NOTICE OF ANNUAL MEETING



<u>MESSAGE FROM YOUR GENERAL MANAGER & BOARD PRESIDENT</u>

Successful organizations show a capacity and willingness to change. Oakdale Electric Cooperative has adapted in many ways over its 79 year history and is ready to take on future challenges. We believe providing safe, reliable, and affordable electricity is essential to improving the life in the communities we serve. We strive every day to keep the lights on and to exceed member's electric service expectations with both honesty and integrity. It is by working towards these goals, day in and day out, that we remain committed to you. We've had success at Oakdale Electric Cooperative and it has a lot to do with having great people—having great membership, and having great leadership from the board.

When discussing the future of the utility industry it has been said that the growing popularity of solar energy, energy efficiency and new environmental regulations is proof that utilities are "industry dinosaurs" and will cease to exist. Our belief is the future is full of promise. Distributed generation is an opportunity for growth and more choices for our members. Oakdale Electric Cooperative believes it is important to have a diverse supply of energy and has been considering construction of a community solar project. This project will provide an opportunity for members to support the development of solar energy even if it is not practical to install panels on their own homes. We look forward to sharing more information on this project with our members in the coming months.

There are several important reasons why we were able to maintain stable rates. Dairyland Power Cooperative, our power supplier, makes every effort to keep rates reasonable and to meet our future needs. In past years, many different variables have made this difficult. Through hard work and persistence, they have achieved stability in rates for the past two years. No environmental changes. Although the EPA is working on new regulations regarding carbon pollution guidelines, the new regulations are not final. This has helped keep power costs stable. The EPA is reviewing the comments and will decide later this year whether to change the proposed regulations or leave them as originally planned. Over 60 percent of Wisconsin's electricity is produced from coal-fired power plants. So the proposed regulations could have a significant effect on Wisconsin electric production and rates.

In very few business sectors can the decision makers say they are looking out for the best interest of the people who receive the product or service. Usually the people making the decisions are doing so on behalf of investors or for an ownership stake. So the question is, how can we make things easier and better for you, our member? We can provide you energy efficiency measures that will save energy, as a result save money on your electric bill. Rebates are available for energy efficiency upgrades. As a matter of fact, over the last year, Oakdale Electric Cooperative and our power supplier have provided more than \$49 thousand in rebates to our members for electric water heaters and more energy efficient appliances, lighting, and heating and cooling systems.

We believe it's our responsibility to help drive quality of life improvements in our communities. One example is Operation Round Up® which provides donations to those





Capital Credits

Margins are the amount remaining after all proper expenses are deducted from revenues for a given year. Capital Credits are the amount of margins assigned, or allocated, to each member based on their patronage. This is one of the unique benefits of receiving electric service from a not-for-profit cooperative. Since 1965, Oakdale Electric Cooperative has returned more than \$20 million in capital credits back to members.

Communications

Members stay informed by reading our monthly magazine, the WEC News. Other communication tools that we use to keep you updated on your electric service include bill stuffers, messages on your bill, Facebook, email, and our newly re-designed website (www.oakdalerec.com).

Forever in Blue Jeans

Every week OEC employees make a donation in order to wear blue jeans to work on Fridays, hence the name "Blue Jeans Friday". Once the fund has reached a certain dollar amount, employees choose a local non-profit to donate their proceeds. To date, OEC employees have donated over \$3,500 to individuals and organizations in our service area.

Education is Power

A post-secondary education is a hefty investment that can be very stressful. Oakdale Electric Cooperative believes strongly in supporting students as they embark on their educational paths. From our unclaimed capital credits, we established a scholarship fund to help ease the financial burden. Four different \$1,000 scholarships are available annually: Student, At-Large Student, Non-Traditional, and Lineworker. Food for Thought

For the third year in a row, OEC had the opportunity to donate funds to a charitable organization and have those funds matched by CoBank, a member-owned cooperative bank in which OEC is a member. Pantries are a vital and necessary resource in our service areas by providing thousands of pounds of food per month to needy individuals and families. Besides alleviating hunger, food pantries make resource referrals, and provide hunger education and awareness to local businesses, organizations, and schools. OEC donated \$2,500 to nine local food pantries and CoBank donated a matching \$2,500.





Hotline Safety Demos

For over 50 years, OEC has been visiting local schools/ organizations to present the Hotline Safety Demonstration. In this program, professional line workers teach citizens to respect electricity and stay safe from power line danger by displaying what happens when a tree branch, kite. or person (simulated by a hotdog) accidentally touch an energized power line. The safety lesson learned is very impactful and long remembered.


