He watched and learned from his father and grandfather, but honed in on his carpentry skills when he sought out to build a home with wife, Tammy, 25-plus years ago. Their joint venture took over a year to complete, but the end result was a beautiful country home, custom made for their lifestyle.

Rich filled the rooms with hand-built or repurposed furniture because "we didn't have the money at the time to buy new." Little by little, he'd build a piece or buy an older item to redo. The impressive list of completed furniture now includes a TV cabinet, bedroom set, chairs, tables, and headboards, most leaning towards the mission furniture style, Dvorak's preference. His skills, expertise, and ideas grew over the years, as did his penchant for giving old furniture new life.

Rich's passion for repurposing reclaimed, salvaged materials turned from a hobby into something more in just a blink of two ladies' eyes.

**The Shed Breaks Ground** Kathy Von Haden and Tammy Dvorak struck up a friendship over their common interest in gardening. The two spent hours together getting their hands dirty at Hillview Farm, Kathy and husband, Gary's, family farm in rural Tomah. The gardens expanded, and it was just a

matter of time before these two go-getter gals got an idea and ran full steam ahead with it. They devised a plan to build a garden shed to house and sell their farm-fresh veggies, right from Kathy's farm yard.

"We have an idea!"

Words Rich would eventually learn to wince at because it usually meant a new honey-do item.

Always the supportive husband, Rich's carpentry skills were put to use as he brought this vision to life, with Kathy and Tammy's help. A discarded ramp, leftover building materials, and even broken poles from Oakdale Electric Cooperative were collected. Everything but the hardware was salvaged but still in great condition, just needing a little elbow grease. With a little creativity and a lot of sweat equity, The Shed construction was completed in August 2014.

**The Shed Blooms** Kathy always had an eye for antiques, including a large collection in her farmhouse basement. She relishes in the fact there is a person with a story behind every antique.

"So many items get thrown away because people don't see the value in them," stated Kathy, "but we do!"

It was a natural progression for them to add home décor to The Shed's inventory. And before long, the walls, floors, and



grounds filled in with a collection of rustic, repurposed pieces sure to appeal to any shopper.

With wheels that never stop turning, and ideas that keep on coming, Kathy and Tammy have made The Shed bloom into a quintessential country shopping experience for adults and children to enjoy. Not only can guests purchase home and lawn décor, plants, flowers, or pick up their CSA (community supported agriculture) garden share, but they can also get a taste of farm life. Kathy and Gary allow and encourage guests to explore the farm, barns, and countryside. It's also perfectly acceptable for visitors to kick back and relax in the newly built corn crib gazebo, while taking in the beautiful rolling hills landscape. They can also take a turn swinging on the hoop with tractor seat, or even let their kids wear themselves out in the farm-fresh air.

All three agree that time devoted to The Shed is not work. It's fun.


#### The Shed Welcomes Visitors A
