Co-op Program Spotlight: Personal Emergency Response Systems

Meet the employee behind the program!

ale Ludeking has installed personal emergency response systems in hundreds of homes for Oakdale Electric Cooperative over the past 17 years. We believe there could not be a more kind-hearted employee to be the face of this program, and Phyllis Miller, Reedsburg, would agree. She fondly referred to Dale as "Mr. Oakdale" the last time he visited her home.

"Dale truly is a one of the nicest, most genuine people I have had the privilege to know and work with," said Rose Bartholomew, finance manager. "He shows each individual the respect and compassion they deserve, while also ensuring their confidence in operating the pendant."

"This is a responsibility that I do not take lightly," Ludeking stated. "Individuals, and their family members, put their trust in me to install the emergency response system correctly to help them stay safe in their homes."

"As we age, independence and security are two things we begin to appreciate more," said Ludeking. A monitored personal emergency response system from Oakdale Electric can help individuals and their loved ones achieve both. Access to help in an emergency situation is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with the simple push of the pendant alert button. Trained Cooperative Response Center employees respond immediately and send medical assistance if needed.

Installation is easy. The system only requires a regular telephone jack and electric outlet, and Dale handles the set-up during a scheduled appointment. You



can count on the cooperative to have a prompt arrival, as well as provide a step-by-step walk-through of the operation and maintenance procedures. If requested, Dale will perform additional pendant tests from different locations in the home to ensure all parties involved feel safe, secure, and confident in the system. Should any questions arise down the road, members can contact the cooperative directly, and Dale will be right back at your home to assist. That is service you and your loved ones can trust in from your local cooperative.

Oakdale Electric now offers the Caretaker Sentry Emergency Response System. This new system features a base station and a water-proof pendant with two-way communication built in, allowing for individuals to speak

directly to the Cooperative Response Center through the pendant. The pendant can be worn around an individual's neck, wrist, or can be attached to the waistband of pants. It has a range of up to 600 feet from the base unit, and will work inside or outside of the home. The co-op still services the Mainstreet Messenger, but will install the Caretaker Sentry for new customers. Those individuals currently using the Mainstreet Messenger can trust in the quality of their system, but understand the cooperative will eventually exchange for the Caretaker Sentry as pendants require battery maintenance.

It's important to note that an individual doesn't have to be a member of the cooperative in order to take advantage of this program. We will happily assist individuals in our local area in need of this additional safety service in their homes.


