YLC: A Cooperative Tradition

or 29 years, Oakdale Electric Cooperative has sponsored area students to attend Youth Leadership Congress (YLC). This is a three-day program for attendees to develop and maximize their leadership skills, study the cooperative business model, and get a taste of college life. A group of 30 students, selected by their high school guidance counselors, traveled to the University of Wisconsin–River Falls July 26–28, ready to immerse themselves in this long-standing cooperative tradition.

In order to attend YLC, it is required that youth must be the son/daughter of an active member of the cooperative, and entering his/her senior year of high school in the fall (2017) at a local public high school. The year ahead is an exciting, sometimes scary time as students find themselves having to finalize important decisions on their future education and

work plans. For many of the youth in attendance, attaining either a two- or four-year college degree is in their immediate goals. YLC provides real college experience including living in the dorms, with a random roommate and no air conditioning, dining at the cafeteria, and learning in academic lecture halls.

Students engaged with professional motivational speakers (most notably Craig Hillier), participated in outdoor team-building activities, listened to a lecture on the cooperative basics, and discussed cooperative career opportunities with current industry professionals.

at Youth Leadership Congress. Dr. Al Snyder entertained the 130 teens with his hilarious hypnosis show, and Melissa Wilson, director of career services, oversaw a five-course etiquette dinner that provided the golden rules to follow when dining out. Following the meal, students swapped their formal attire for more casual clothing and finished up the night with a

rocking dance party.

The Youth Leadership Congress program is unique because it is always planned with the assistance of the previous year's youth board members. A youth board term is one year, and attendees had the opportunity to apply and earn one of the open six positions. Becoming a youth board member is not an easy feat, as students must first complete a panel interview, followed by a speech presentation to their fellow peers, who vote on their top six candidates. Sam Peterson (Tomah High School) and Conor O'Donnell (Nekoosa High School) will proudly represent Oakdale Electric



Cooperative this coming year. Not only will Sam and Conor oversee the 2018 YLC planning sessions, they will also be traveling to Washington, D.C., on next year's Youth Tour. Congratulations, Sam and Conor. We are honored to have you both representing Oakdale Electric Cooperative this coming year!

Upon returning from YLC, students have the opportunity to submit essays vying for an Oakdale Electric Cooperative and Wisconsin Electrical Cooperative Association Scholarship to use for post-secondary education. Scholarships are awarded annually to students at each of the 12 high schools in the co-op's service territory. Since 1988, Oakdale Electric has awarded \$359,000 to deserving students throughout the cooperative service area. Oakdale Electric's scholarship program does not affect electric rates; it is funded with unclaimed capital credits that otherwise would be forfeited to the state.


